To The Honble. The Speaker and Gentlemen of the Legislative Assembly Gentlemen,

I have received the annual report from the Colonial Auditor upon the Accounts of the Colony for the year ending 31st December 1863.

From that report it appears that the total sum expended during the Year amounts to \$157,532.41—while the votes of the House for the same period amounted to \$275,680.00. Detailed Accounts have already been laid before the House from which it will be seen that the principal cause of this large difference between the Votes and the expenditure arises from the non-disbursement of \$87,300.00 appropriated towards the improvement of Victoria Harbour, and the non-bringing to account of the Sum of \$18,857.00 payments for interest and sinking fund on account of the £40,000 Loan. Notwithstanding, however, that the expenditure falls so far short of the Supply there are several items of disbursement which are not covered by any heads of Service, and in some cases the expenditure under the heads of Service has exceeded the Vote of the House.

In both these cases the Vote of the House is necessary to enable the Auditor finally to pass the Accounts for the Year.

I therefore enclose a Statement exhibiting under the regular heads of Service the excess of expenditure over the classified Votes, and of the Sums expended for Services for which no provision was made; amounting in the whole to \$19,804.28 and I beg to recommend to the House the propriety of passing a Vote for the said Sum of Nineteen thousand eight hundred and four dollars and twenty eight cents to close the accounts for the year ending 31st December, 1863.

I have the honor to forward herewith for the consideration of the Legislative Assembly Copy of a Communication I have this day received from the Municipal Council of the City of Victoria, representing the amount of their existing Liabilities, and requesting that they may be supplied with funds to discharge the same, as, for the reasons stated, they are unable to raise the necessary Moneys.

2. In consideration of all the circumstances of this case, with which the Assembly are already well acquainted, I would submit to the House the propriety of empowering me to pay to the Corporation out of the general Revenue of the Colony the Sum of Six Thousand Dollars to enable the Council to liquidate Liabilities incurred by them in discharge of the duties and responsibilities cast upon them by virtue of their office; and to repay these moneys to the general Revenue, as well as other moneys already expended on behalf of the Corporation, I would recommend that the Legislature should pass An Act by which an additional sum of one half of one per cent can be collected upon the Government Assessment Roll for the City of Victoria for the year ending 30th June 1864, those persons who may have paid Real Estate taxes to the Corporation in December last being exempted from the operation of such Act.

In compliance with your request as conveyed to His Worship The Mayor on the 12th Instant we beg most respectfully to lay before Your Excellency the accompanying statement in Schedule hereto annexed of the indebtedness of the Corporation of this City up to the present time.

Owing to the serious defect in the Act of Incorporation and the failure of the House of Assembly to amend said Act, the Corporation find themselves powerless to raise the necessary funds to meet their present indebtedness.

We therefore humbly pray that Your Excellency will take such measures as to Your Excellency may seem best, and cause to be placed at the disposal of the Mayor and Council a sum sufficient (say Six Thousand Dollars) to pay their liabilities due to the present time.

We would also most respectfully call Your Excellency's Attention to the fact that a portion of the Real Estate Tax levied by the Corporation in December last has been paid in good faith by the Owners of property in the City.

The Council now have serious doubts as to their power of enforcing the payment of the balance due on that Assessment; they therefore feel that a great injustice would be done those who have paid were we to retain the amount.

We therefore humbly pray that Your Excellency will cause to be refunded to the Corporation the Sum of Five Thousand three hundred and Sixty two dollars (\$5362.00) in order that the Council may refund the same to those who have paid. We trust that Your Excellency will see the injustice of this Course and also its propriety when we state that if the Council are not empowered to refund those taxes it will doubtless lead to tedious and expensive litigation.

Trusting that this matter will receive every due consideration at the hands of Your Excellency.

In respect to the second Resolution I beg to inform the House that the subject of Reciprocity between the Colony and the United States of America has not been brought under my notice and consequently I have taken no steps in respect thereto neither does it appear that any recent Action in this matter was taken by my Predecessor.

Vancouver's Island Victoria, 17th May, 1864

To The Honorable The Speaker and Gentlemen of The Legislative Assembly. Gentlemen

The Vote of the Legislature for the improvement of the Harbour being already overdrawn it becomes necessary that I should bring the present position of the undertaking under the consideration of the Legislative Assembly with a view to their providing for the future cost thereof.

2 By an Act of the Legislature passed in 1862 authorising the Governor to borrow the Sum of Forty Thousand Pounds on the Security of the General Revenue, A Sum of $\pm 18,000$ was set apart for the purpose of improving the Harbour of Victoria.

3 Under that Authority and a Vote of the House the following Expenditure has been incurred.

These Sums do not include the cost of a Workshop. Forge, Storehouse or hoisting Tackle, all of which are immediately necessary if the work is to be continued, and for which no Estimate has been made.

4 No Salary has been provided for "A competent Superintending Engineer, estimated by the Surveyor General at ± 500 per annum a salary in my opinion inadequate to secure the Services of An Officer of that description.

5 The dredging Machine completed, I cannot estimate the wear and tear, salaries and working expenses, generally, at less than Ten Thousand Pounds per annum, though the Surveyor General sets it down at half that Sum.

6 The Surveyor General (as I understand the Report herewith, dated 7th May 1864) is of opinion that this Expenditure "for 3 succeeding Years would be required to make Victoria Harbour." But the board of which that officer was a Member in 1862 impress[ed] upon the Governor "the extensive nature of the under-taking and [to] guard against the expectation that any permanent results can be looked for under a Series of Years," that it "would require the undivided attention and superintendence of an Engineer experienced in such operations and it did not seem probable that such a work could be completed under favorable circumstances, with one Dredging Machine within a period of six or seven years."⁸⁴

7 The original Estimate appended to the Commissioners Report (of Feby. 28th 1862) must have been wholly fallacious, or the Expenditure of 1864 must be exorbitant, for I find the Estimate for a Steam Dredge, twelve Scows, Tug Steamer, and Diving Bell Workshop, Forge Tools, and Sundries amounted to £9,500, while the Actual Outlay for a part only of this Service will cost £18,133.

 $8\,$ I am of opinion that the estimated working expenses will bear a like proportion to the actual cost.

9. It will appear on reference to the "Tabular Statement" accompanying the Commissioner's Report (and upon which date calculations appear to have been made) that the cost of Five Dredges, a Steam Tug, two diving Bells and 160 punts cost (in Scotland) $\pm 39,000$, while the one now in process of construction in this harbour will cost $\pm 18,133$ at least.

10. With these data before them the Legislative Assembly will be enabled to decide upon the sum necessary to place at my disposal for the completion of this formidable undertaking.

From the foregoing figures it is obvious that the removal of 500,000 C. yards would vastly benefit the Harbour. This would occupy the Dredge if properly worked 2-3 years: making due allowance for accidents the foregoing is a moderate Estimate.

No estimate has been included for removing Rock for except on a Small Scale this would not be required. If would cost \$5.00 per Cubic Yard if above water \$11.00 if below.

Annual Expenses.

The Estimate on this point of the Harbour Commission which I assisted in the preparation of would show that An Expenditure of £5000 a Year, which would include £500 a year for the Services of a competent Superintending Engineer whose whole time and services would be required and which would include £500 a year for wear and tear and contingencies for 3 succeeding years [blank] be required to make Victoria Harbour.

Divers are not an important item since blasting in deep water is not contemplated to any extent. Working Engineers Wages average $\pounds 250$ per annum each.

In reply to His Excellency's queries 8, 9, and 14, I am not aware that any executive arrangements have been made which would throw the sole responsibility of Success or failure of the Harbour Improvement on One Superintending Officer and with regard to the Harbour Proclamation it would be of course impossible for the Postmaster engaged at an indoor occupation to say whether ashes were being thrown overboard a Steamer or not &c. but I would respectfully suggest that the Superintending Engineer might also do Harbour Masters and Lighthouse duty.

I have the honor to transmit the Copy of a Despatch received from Her Majesty's Secretary of State for the Colonies in reply to the Resolution of the Legislative Assembly transmitted by my Predecessor in a Despatch dated the 12th February, 1864.

The House will observe on reference to the Estimates which they have passed for the year 1864, that provision has not been made for the Salaries of the following Officers, namely,

Sir,

I have received Sir James Douglas' Despatch No. 3 of the 12th February enclosing A Resolution of the House of Assembly of Vancouver Island in which the House declines to pass the Civil List Act proposed in the Duke of Newcastle's Despatch marked "Separate" of the 15th of June last. I regret that the House of Assembly did not feel able to concur in the proposals submitted to it on this Subject.

I am desirous however to prevent as far as possible the disappointment and inconvenience to Individuals which this decision might occasion.

It appears from the Resolution of the Assembly that the Crown Land Fund for the year 1863 amounted to £4,500, but that a considerable portion of this Sum consisted of the proceeds of Sales effected in former Years. There may be Sources of Revenue, such as fines and forfeitures, fees of office, the proceeds of which The Crown could justly appropriate, but in the absence of any precise information on this head, I can only authorise you to issue Warrants for the payment of the Salaries of the Governor and the Colonial Secretary at the respective Rates of £3000, and £600, per annum assigned to them by my Predecessor, out of any funds which may be under the direct control and at the disposal of the Crown.

It will of course rest with the Legislature to make provision for the remuneration of the other officers employed under the Government in

any way and from any source which may seem most appropriate to them.

Besides the Civil List, Sir James Douglas's Despatch raises a still larger and more important question, namely, the Union of the Colonies under one Governor, though with some distinct administrative Departments.

On this subject I am desirous of having the benefit of your views as you shall have acquired, on the spot, sufficient knowledge and experience to enable you to form your opinion and to supply reliable information for the assistance and guidance of Her Majesty's Government in considering the question. I shall, in like manner, ask Governor Seymour, to whom I shall communicate a Copy of this Despatch to furnish his views on the same matter, and I need scarcely say that it will not only be unobjectionable but highly desirable that you and he should consult freely on the subject, although it will be the most convenient course that ultimately each should report to me independently the conclusions which he may form on the subject.

The Chairman reported that the Committee having had under consideration the above-mentioned Report had adopted therein certain Resolutions embodied in an address to His Excellency the Governor, as follows.

To His Excellency, A. E. Kennedy, C. B.

Governor of Vancouver Island, &c. &c. &c.

May it please Your Excellency

We, Her Majesty's dutiful and loyal subjects, the House of Assembly of Vancouver Island in this present Session convened, have had under consideration the Crown Lands of the Colony with the object of determining the advisability of accepting the control of them in return for voting a Civil List mentioned in the Despatch of His Grace the Duke of Newcastle of June, 1863.

During our investigations we have learned the following facts and have formed the following opinions.

1. That the Hudson's Bay Company of England became possessed of all the Crown Lands of the Colony, without any exception by virtue of and under the conditions contained in a Royal Grant made on January 13th 1849, and, as Trustees of the Crown, they were bound by the Grant to sell the Crown Lands for colonisation purposes, and that the gross proceeds of the Sales after deducting therefrom one tenth for the special benefit and use of the Company, were to be devoted to the Colonisation and settlement of the Island.

2. That the Hudson's Bay Company have sold a part of the Crown Lands to divers persons for the purposes of Colonisation and settlement; that a part of the Crown Lands have been set apart as Reserves for Public Purposes; and that the title to the remaining portion of the Crown Lands is still vested in the Company in confirmity with the conditions of the Grant of January 13th 1849.

3. That the Hudson's Bay Company are willing to convey back the unsold remainder of the Crown Lands, including certain Reserves for Public Purposes, to the Crown in accordance with the conditions of an Indenture made in London on February 3rd 1862 between Her Majesty and the Hudson's Bay Company.

4 That during the Investigations of this House into the condition of the Crown Lands, it has learned that the Hudson's Bay Company have sold portions of Sections 18, and 32, and hold Section 31 (all of Victoria District) with portions of Sections 18 and 32 as their private property; that the approximate Sum of money

received for Sales in Sections 18 and 32 is \$426,237. and that the approximate value of the property still held by the Company as their private property in Sections 18, 31, and 32 is \$339,200, making the total amount of the Sales and the value of the property in these Sections still in possession of the Company \$765,437.; and it appears that not one farthing has been paid by the Company for the said Sections 18, 31, and 32; that the Company have not accounted to the Colonial Trust Fund for the said \$426,237. or for the said property valued at \$339,200, and that by the conditions of the Royal Grant of January 13th 1849, the Company were bound to account to Her Majesty for the property known as Sections 18, 31, and 32, aforesaid and the sales thereof in the same manner as for other portions of the Crown Lands.

5 That by virtue of the said Indenture of February 3rd 1862, it is proposed to allow the Hudson's Bay Company to remain in undisputed possession of the said \$426,237 in sales, and the said \$339,200 in property, and further that it is proposed in the said Indenture to convey away all the water frontage in Victoria Harbour, and Cadboro' Bay, fronting on land sold or held by the Company abutting on the water of Victoria Harbour and Cadboro Bay, and that the said water frontage may be stated on an approximate estimate to be worth \$500,000.

6. That if the said Indenture of February 3rd 1862 be not annulled the Crown will lose the vast Sum of \$1,265,437. or thereabouts in money and property, less one tenth of the aforesaid \$426,237.

7 That if the said Indenture of February 3rd, 1862, be annulled and a settlement made between the Crown and the Hudsons Bay Company on the conditions of the Royal Grant of January 13th 1849, that is to say by crediting the Company with the value of their Establishments in the Colony on the expiry of the Royal License of exclusive Trade with the Indians on the North West Coast of America which terminated on May 30th 1859, and also by crediting the Company with the advances made by them for colonising the Island, there would, in all probability be a Balance which the Company would be bound to account for to the Crown of about \$1,000,000. in money and property.

8 That in the opinion of this House there is no good and sufficient reason to justify a Settlement between the Crown and the Hudsons Bay Company on the conditions set forth in said Indenture of February 3rd 1862.

9. That in the opinion of this House, the said Indenture of February 3rd 1862 ought to be annulled and a settlement made between the Crown and Hudsons Bay Company in conformity with the conditions of the Royal Grant of January 13th 1849.

10. That, in the opinion of this House if a final Settlement be made between the Crown and the Hudsons Bay Company on the conditions set forth in the said Indenture of February 3rd 1862, not only will there be a serious injury done to the finances of the Colony materially affecting the proposition of His Grace the Duke of Newcastle, but that Her Majestys Government will sustain a serious loss in the sums already paid out of the Imperial Treasury to the Company for the Colonisation of the Island which, in the opinion of this House, would be restored if a settlement were made between the Crown and Company on the conditions of the Grant of January 13th 1849.

11. That, in the opinion of this House, Your Excellency ought to impress on Her Majesty's Government the necessity that exists for annulling the said Indenture of February 3rd 1862, in order to make a Settlement between the Crown and Company in conformity with the conditions of the Royal Grant of January 1849, and furthermore that Your Excellency ought on behalf of the Crown to appoint a Commission empowered to administer oaths and send for persons and papers to enquire into the Sums of money expended specially and essentially by the Company for colonising this Island in accordance with the Royal Grant of 1849 and furthermore to enquire whether any Sales of land in the said Sections 18, 31, and 32, have been made by the Company since January 1st 1862; and furthermore to determine what lands of this Colony and the value thereof have been lawfully sold by the Company, and to learn the amount of money deducted from the gross proceeds of such sales by the Company as the tenth allowed to them in the Royal Grant of 1849.

12. That, in the opinion of this House, no attempt should be made to disturb third parties in the possession of Lands derived from the Hudson's Bay Company except such lands be part of existing Public Reserves lawfully made in accordance with the Royal Grant of 1849 and even in the latter case no attempt should be made to disturb third parties in the possession of such Lands except great public inconvenience would probably arise therefrom, and in case the Hudsons Bay Company have sold illegally or by mistake parts of public Reserves they should be made to restore such portions or indemnify the Crown to the value thereof as the public interest may require.

13. That, in the opinion of this House, Your Excellency ought to take all and every such measures either by sending one or more Agents to England to lay the condition of the Crown Lands before Her Majesty's Government or the Imperial Parliament or both, or by employing able Counsel in England to take proceedings to annul the said Indenture of February 3rd 1862 and bring about a speedy settlement between the Crown and Hudson's Bay Company on the conditions of the Royal Grant of 1849.

14. That in the opinion of this House, Your Excellency should stop all proceedings now pending to confirm the Hudson's Bay Company in possession, as their private property, of any portion of Sections 18, 31, and 32, aforesaid, till such time as the measures hereinbefore or hereinafter mentioned shall be taken and shall have been finally concluded.

15 That in the opinion of this House Your Excellency ought not to take any Steps to confirm Mr. Leopold Löwenberg in the possession of Section Z of James Bay Government Reserve; but that it should be held as part of the original ten Acres reserved for the Crown as an Indian Reserve in 1854 of which the Hudsons Bay Company received due notice in a letter dated September 15th [1st] 1854 addressed by Mr. J. D. Pemberton, Surveyor General to A. Barclay, Esqre., Secretary of the Hudson's Bay Company;91 and for the further reason that Mr. D. McTavish in a letter dated Victoria V. I. 21st January 1863 addressed to Thomas Fraser Esqre. Secretary of the Hudson's Bay Company, stated that it was proposed by the Company to convey to the Crown ten Acres in the said "Government Buildings" or "James Bay Government Reserve;" whereas if the said Section Z be confirmed to Mr. Leopold Lowenberg the original Reserve of Ten Acres proposed by Mr. McTavish to be conveyed to the Crown will be diminished by the Area of said Section Z; and, furthermore it is our wish that Your Excellency may be pleased to communicate this our opinion to Her Majesty's Principal Secretary of State for the Colonies before taking any steps to confirm Mr. Leopold Lowenberg in the possession of Section Z in accordance with the instructions in the Despatch of His Grace the Duke of Newcastle, dated March 16, 1864.

16 That in the opinion of this House, Your Excellency should take such measures as may for ever prevent the Church Reserve in the City of Victoria from being let out in lots or covered with private Residences, or business places of any kind in order that it may be for ever preserved as a public Square.

We, the House of Assembly in Vancouver Island, would therefore humbly pray that Your Excellency may be pleased to take the facts and opinions hereinbefore set forth into Your earnest consideration, and appoint such a Commission and for such purposes as are hereinbefore stated, and that Your Excellency may be pleased to take such other measures as are hereinbefore mentioned and any other means that may from time to time appear expedient to Your Excellency to annul the said Indenture of February 3rd 1862, and bring about a final Settlement between the Crown and Hudsons Bay Company on the basis of the conditions of the Royal Grant of January 13th 1849 and secure a speedy reconveyance of the Island by the Company to the Crown.

The House then went into Committee of the whole upon A Communication received from His Excellency The Governor, dated 27th Inst. enclosing A Despatch ("No. 2"—Downing Street, 30th April) from Her Majesty's Principal Secretary of State for the Colonies, upon the subject of the Absence of Provision in the Estimates for the Salaries of the Chief Justice, Attorney General, Colonial Treasurer, and Surveyor General.

Upon motion of Mr. De Cosmos seconded by Mr. Duncan, The Standing Orders were suspended, and The Resolutions above mentioned were agreed to unanimously.

Vancouver Island Victoria 30th June, 1864

To the Honorable The Speaker and Members of the Legislative Assembly Gentlemen,

I have received by the hands of your Speaker the Copy of Resolutions in reply to a Communication which I had the honor to make to the Legislative Assembly on the 27th Instant, transmitting the Copy of a Despatch from Her Majesty's Secretary of State for the Colonies No. 2 dated 30th April 1864. The Legislative Assembly in reply to that communication resolve "That this House is of opinion that the Salaries mentioned (namely the Chief Justice, Attorney General, Treasurer and Surveyor General) should be paid, as heretofore, out of the Crown Revenues and would recommend that course."

The terms of the Despatch of the Secretary of State which you have had under consideration unfortunately prohibit me from adopting that recommendation, and clearly point out that the Salaries of the Governor and Colonial Secretary only are chargeable to that fund.

It is therefore obvious that unless the Legislature make provision for the remuneration of the remaining Officers of the Government from some other source, as pointed out by the fourth paragraph of the Secretary of State's Despatch, their Salaries must cease and a question will then arise as to the authority under which they have received Salary since the 1st January, 1864.

Extra-ordinary Session

The House met this day at 3 p. m. pursuant to adjournment, and in obedience to the Order of the House made yesterday.

Present: Mr. Speaker in the Chair, Messrs. De Cosmos, Duncan, Dennes, Street, Carswell, Franklin, and Drs. Tolmie, Trimble, Powell.

The last Minutes having been read and confirmed.

The House went into Committee of the whole upon A Communication received from His Excellency the Governor dated 30th June 1864, in reply to certain Resolutions passed by the Legislative Assembly on the 29th Inst. upon the subject of the absence of Provision in the Estimates for the Salaries of the Chief Justice, Attorney General, Colonial Treasurer and Surveyor General.

Mr. Speaker left the Chair.

Mr. Dennes in the chair of the Committee.

Mr. Speaker resumed the Chair.

The Chairman reported that the Committee having had under consideration the foregoing Communication from His Excellency The Governor had Resolved That this House after having had the Message of His Excellency the Governor of June 30th under consideration is of the opinion:

1 That the question of voting Salaries for the Chief Justice, Attorney General, Colonial Treasurer, and Surveyor General, cannot, in accordance with the established usage of this House, be entertained again in the present Session, in as much as this House has already expressed an opinion on the subject.

2 That this House is still impressed with the opinion that the present Crown Revenues, pending their acceptance by the Colony in return for the Civil List, should, as heretofore, bear the entire burden of the Civil List; but inasmuch as Her Majesty's Principal Secretary of State for the Colonies in his Despatch of April 30th, 1864, only authorises His Excellency the Governor to pay out of the Crown revenue the Salaries of the Governor and Colonial Secretary; and as His Excellency the Governor does not deem himself empowered to issue his Warrant for the payment of the Salaries of the Chief Justice, Attorney General, Colonial Treasurer, and Surveyor General out of the Crown Revenues; and as great public and individual inconvenience or injury may arise from the nonpayment of the Salaries of these officials, this House hereby pledges itself to indemnify His Excellency the Governor in case he shall take the responsibility of paying the said Salaries out of the Crown Revenues while awaiting further instructions from Her Majesty's Government.

3 That in case His Excellency the Governor shall not consider himself justified in paying the Salaries of the Chief Justice, Attorney General, Colonial Treasurer, and Surveyor General, out of the Crown Revenues on the pledge of indemnity of this House, or in the case the Crown Revenues from any cause be insufficient for that purpose, this House recommends His Excellency the Governor to issue his warrant for the payment of the whole or part of the said Salaries out of the General Revenue whilst awaiting further instructions from Her Majesty's Government on this subject, and an answer on the question of a joint Civil List with British Columbia; and in case His Excellency the Governor shall issue his Warrant for the payment of the whole or part of the said Salaries out of the General Revenue, this House hereby pledges itself to indemnify him for so doing.

4 That this House wishes it to be distinctly understood that the pledges herein given, and the recommendation to use the General Revenue are not to be construed to mean an intention on its part to make the General Revenue permanently liable for the Civil List of the Colony either on the terms of the Despatch of [15] June, 1863, or on the conditions set forth in the Despatch of April 30, 1864; but that the intention of this House is merely to afford temporary aid to the Executive in the present Exigency.

5. That with regard to the Salaries paid since the 1st day of Jany. 1864, the House is of opinion that they have been paid according to precedent out of the Crown Revenues—those officers having always been considered Crown officers, and that such a course is consonant with the views of this House.

6. That His Excellency be respectfully requested on the part of this House to urge upon Her Majesty's Government the necessity that exists for continuing to pay the Crown Officers out of the Crown Revenues as heretofore.

Ordered That Report be received, and agreed to.

On the motion of Mr. Duncan Seconded by Mr. De Cosmos The Standing Orders were suspended and the foregoing Resolutions were adopted.

The House then adjourned at the Call of Mr. Speaker.

Friday, the 8th day of July, 1864

The House met this day at 12.45 p. m. at the call of Mr. Speaker.

- Present: Mr. Speaker in the Chair, Messrs. De Cosmos, Dennes, Duncan, Carswell, Street, Jackson, Franklin, Drs. Tolmie, Trimble, Powell, and Col. Foster. The last minutes having been read and confirmed.
- Mr. Speaker read the Writ of Election for the District of the City of Victoria returning two Members viz.: Mr. Charles Bedford Young and Mr. George Cruikshank [Cruickshank] (by a tie-vote) in the place of Mr. W. A. G. Young Colonial Secretary resigned.

Mr. Speaker suggested that it would be advisable to postpone the Settlement of the question until the next Session of the House.

Agreed to unanimously.

A Summons then came from His Excellency The Governor, by Mr. Nesbitt, Clerk of the Honble. The Legislative Council.

Mr. Speaker—The Governor desires this Honorable House to attend His Excellency forthwith in the Legislative Council Chamber.

Mr. Speaker, with the House went up to attend his Excellency accordingly.

His Excellency The Governor then addressed both Houses of the Legislature as follows.

Honorable Gentlemen of the Legislative Council and Gentlemen of the Legislative Assembly

1. The State of the Public Business enables me to release you from further attendance and bring this protracted Session to a close.

2. Questions materially affecting the progress of the Colony must come before you at an early period on which I would invite you to acquaint yourselves with the opinions of your constituents prior to the re-assembling of the Legislature.

3. The first and most important of these questions is the proposed Union of British Columbia and Vancouver Island under one Government.

4. As this object can only be obtained with the previous concurrence of the Legislatures of both Colonies, the Course adopted by the Legislative Assembly of Vancouver Island in February last has delayed the consideration of it.

5. The conditions attached to the proposal then Submitted to Her Majesty's Secretary of State for the Colonies were such as could not, in my opinion be accepted by the Sister Colony, or entertained by Her Majesty's Government.

6. Such a Union to be beneficial and lasting must be effected on a basis both practical and equitable. Like all other Unions I apprehend that mutual concessions will be required and personal predilections and prejudices must be laid aside.

7. If on examination it be found that such a Union is in favor with the people of this or both Colonies, and will conduce to their honor and prosperity, it will receive my disinterested and hearty support. I have no doubt that the question fairly put before the Public will be considered with the calmness and moderation becoming so grave a subject.

8. Unreasonable demands and pretensions can but raise new difficulties between two Colonies whose best interests, whether under one or separate Governments are bound up together.

9. A question of scarcely less importance is the acceptance and disposal of the Crown Lands and Revenue of Vancouver Island; while this question remains unsettled, the survey, leasing, sale, and general management of public lands, must be left in their present very unsatisfactory state, to the serious detriment of the best interests of this Colony.

10. The Course which has been taken in reference to the proposal of the Secretary of State for the Colonies for a permanent Civil List has resulted in delay and embarassment.

11. That this Colony has ample resources to provide for its own Government on a becoming Scale cannot be doubted, and I feel confident that the people, if appealed to, will cheerfully accede to a provision for the public servants commensurate with the responsibilities and duties of their respective positions.

12. The important subject of emigration must be left untouched while the possession and disposal of the Crown Lands remain unsettled. A Colony without a fixed population cannot be permanently prosperous.

13. I have deferred acknowledging the receipt of the Resolutions adopted by the Legislative Assembly on the subject of Crown Lands, waiting the receipt of the Evidence and Report upon which they are founded and without which I am unable to decide upon the course best calculated to give effect to the views of the House.

14. The House may be assured that I will deal justly and impartially with the subject, as far as it lies within my jurisdiction.

15. I will direct my earnest attention to the economical application of the Supplies you have granted for the current Year, to secure the attainment of the objects for which they were voted.

16. I am happy to assure you of the peace, prosperity, and order which prevail throughout the Colony. The absence of pauperism and serious crime are subjects of solid congratulation.

17. I find that the following Acts passed during the Session received the Assent of my Predecessor on behalf of Her Majesty.
